#### INTRO.

The United Nations Geographic Information Working Group (UNGIWG) is a voluntary network of UN professionals working in the fields of cartography and geographic information science.

Since 2000 UNGIWG has been able to facilitate inter-agency cooperation and coordination on specific issues in the fields of cartography and geographic information science and promote the use of geographic information within the United Nations System in the delivery of various mandates (including in support of a number of sustainable development goals)



### **UNGIWG AIMS TO:**

- Improve the efficient use of geographic information for better decision-making;
- Promote standards and norms for maps and other geospatial information;
- Develop core geospatial data to avoid duplication;
- Build mechanisms for sharing, maintaining and assuring the quality of geographic information;
- Provide a forum for discussing common issues and emerging technological advances.



#### **MODUS OPERANDI**

- UNGIWG functions in a task-driven, goal-oriented and flexible manner.
- The Co-Chairs the focal point, elected by the voting members every two years (currently UNOOSA & UNDSS: 2013 – 2015).
- UNGIWG works through:
  - Annual Plenary Meetings
  - Time-bound, specific and ad-hoc Task Groups
  - Longer-term Special Interest Groups

# CORE AND THEMATIC DATA NEEDS IDENTIFIED



Sustainable Development, Humanitarian and Peacekeeping Operations, Security are major focus areas



Focus: The SALB project

Started in parallel with the early geodatabase work (seed funding from UN Foundation, 2002) and the International Boundaries dataset development (<u>http://www.ungiwg.org/content/united-nations-</u> international-and-administrative-boundaries-resources);

Esri also provided in-kind support

<u>Open</u>, seamless, validated, standardized coding and global dataset of second-level administrative boundaries

The SALB Project status website (currently in maintenance!) <u>http://www.unsalb.org/</u> (coded historic changes from 1990-1<sup>st</sup>, 2000-2<sup>nd</sup> in 136 countries, GIS data for some 50)



## **THE VISION FOR A UNSDI**

The vision for UNSDI - the creation of a comprehensive, decentralised geospatial information framework that facilitates decision making at various levels within the UN by enabling access, retrieval, dissemination and use of geospatial data and information (scientific, environmental, social and economic data, etc.) in a rapid and secure way.



# UNSDI INITIATIVE – BRIEF HISTORY

- 2005 UNGIWG embarked on the development of UNSDI.
- 2006 Developed UNSDI Strategy
- 2007 Selection of the approach to implement a UNSDI
- 2008 Developed UNSDI Framework
- 2010 Recognized as a UN System-wide Information and Communication Technology (ICT) harmonization initiative
- 2010 UNSDI Framework update & development of the Center of Excellence for UNSDI Project Proposal
- 2012 Center of Excellence Programme launched



### **UNSDI GOVERNANCE**

- Steering Committee (SC UNGIWG members) Sets the strategic direction for UNSDI
- **Technical Advisory Group** (TAG UN and non-UN) Advises the Steering Committee on technical matters
- **Partners' Group** (PG non-UN)

Is the advocacy group of UNSDI partners

• SC and TAG members to be nominated / elected



#### **UNSDI FRAMEWORK – PHASE I**

- Core Deliverables: planned to be implemented through the envisaged Center of Excellence for UNSDI Programme
  - UNSDI Gazetteer Framework
  - Geospatial Data Warehouse
  - Visualization Facility
- Thematic Geodatasets and Services:
  - Humanitarian
  - Peacekeeping
  - Safety and Security
  - Environment
  - Human Rights
  - Development
- Capacity Building



Member Agency example:

#### FAO Land and Water Division (NRL) Activities

- Assessment and Monitoring of Land Resources
  - Management and planning of land resources utilization
  - Land Cover/Use assessment and mapping
- Poverty Mapping / Emergencies support
  - GIS databases in support of poverty, food insecurity, and rurality studies
  - Emergency preparedness support: Lao, Haiti, Pakistan, Afghanistan etc..
- Partnership in International Programme
  - GLCN (Global Land Cover Network): alliance for standard multi-purpose land cover data production
  - CARBOAFRICA: network of observations of carbon stocks and fluxes, and ecological processes in sub-Saharan Africa
- Data Dissemination Systems
  - Metadata/Data catalogue: FAO GeoNetwork (data.fao.org)
- Outreach / Communication / Capacity Building
  - Communication materials: brochures, leaflet, posters, skins, printed atlases, etc.. in support of land cover mapping initiatives

#### GLOBAL AGRO-ECOLOGICAL ZONES (GAEZ)

- GAEZ is a methodology for assessing agricultural resources and potential.
- Developed in the last 30 years by FAO and the International Institute for Applied Systems Analysis (IIASA).
- It has produced a database of terabytes of spatial data, maps, tables, statistics, metadata and reports publicly available through the GAEZ WEB portal.
